Each new edition of this catalogue - like its 'mate', I consider to be actually a handbook - has had considerably more added to each new edition until I can find little that has not been covered in its more than 580 pages. (Now at 800 pages in 2025)

John has sought and acquired the right to include the work of recognized experts in virtually all the many fields of BNA and Canada philately to the end of the reign of George VI. There are two exceptions; for good reasons the

listings for the official first flight covers and dignitary booklets go to the 1990's.

Anyone with a computer only has to have this eCatalogue for quick and easy reference to answer any questions they may have and it is simple to use. Any section can be accessed with the handy bookmark, and pages can be enlarged to a size suitable for one's eyesight. For additional convenience, there is a section which converts the stamp catalogue numbers assigned by Walsh to their equivalent numbers in the two major catalogues used by many North American, British and Commonwealth collectors. Each volume can be downloaded to portable equipment and taken to stamp bourses/exhibitions, club meetings, virtually anywhere it can be useful for reference when required. Try taking the competition's annually increasingly larger and cumbersome volume with you; and the benefits of using the Walsh version will soon become obvious.

As I peruse the '*eBook*' I find numerous additions and updates to the original chapters in that initial break through edition. More chapters have been added since the previous. This should convince any sceptics that this is the one '*must have reference*' in their philatelic computer library. Many ideas incorporated into this catalogue are unprecedented. In no other single reference book is found the comprehensive detail that Walsh offers. Under each postage stamp design, all known variations are listed including, where applicable — colours, papers, perforations, varieties - many illustrated, proofs, imperforates, specimens, plate number material, lathework, Government of Canada perforated initialled and overprinted OHMS and G issues, and coils and their experimental forerunners.

The Walsh system permits an overview of what exists for each stamp. All in one place. To all issues has been add significant quantities of imaged die proof material. Besides the previously listed seven sections, another four new sections are incorporated and they certainly enhance this latest 2016 catalogue. Numerous die proofs of each listed image are provided.

– a chronological listing of airmail carrying official flights originating only within Canada **11-Canadian and Provincial Revenue Stamps** — includes:

Canada Bills, Inspections, Law; Ontario Laws, Transfer, Luxury, Gasoline; Quebec Law, Registration, Assurance, Licenses, Probation, Transfer; British Columbia 1st - 12th Law; Yukon Law Court, Mining with confirmation that the court law stamps were released before the mining law stamps.

On an inside title page, images of the revenue stamps being catalogued are shown. A very important feature is the provision of rate charts for revenue issues. Absolutely invaluable for the now popular method of collecting revenues; properly used on documents. Of course, rate charts are also provided for the postage stamps. The collector has all the pertinent information at hand and with the detail found in the contents bookmark table, there is no struggle to quickly find where the information is located.

Postal Historian; Nepean Canada

It seems that change is inevitable and never ending. Often I think changes are made simply for change sake and make absolutely no sense. Many times a change is passed off as new when it is actually something from the past brought back to try on a new generation. Various forms of men's and particularly women's fashion are good examples.

When John Walsh first told me about his "new" catalogue for BNA and Canada stamps to be added to the Newfoundland Specialized Stamp Catalogue (NSSC), I thought he was joking. When I found he was serious, I asked "why would collectors want another catalogue." John responded "m'bye, see what I have come up with and you decide." After reviewing the draft he sent me, I was amazed — I liked what he had developed.

John's "new" BNA and Canada section encompasses the Colonies of British North America

and as well the Dominion of Canada until the end of the reign of George VI. It compliments the period that Newfoundland existed as its own country. This makes it a very useful additional reference to editions of the NSSC, particularly for those of us collecting both countries.

John assured me he has brought together significant references from all the recognized sources to make this one of the best, quick references for all of the stamps of pre 1951 BNA. Readers will easily recognize the major difference in this "new" catalogue — stamps printed from the same plate and/or with the same design are all listed together under one whole number. New? — not really, John and his friend, co-author, the late John Butt initially introduced this concept when they published their first NSSC in 1988. I wish to commend John for continuing to publish new enlarged editions. The latest has a greatly expanded postage rate section which is invaluable to postal historians, as will its counter part, in the "new" BNA/Canada section.

As they are very specialized fields and well documented by their respective publications, booklets (panes are listed) and revenues are not included. However, postal stationery is listed, again, very useful for the postal historian.

I am particularly pleased John has incorporated suggestions and used many illustrations I provided. Hopefully, the latter will encourage those collecting only stamps to begin collecting the fascinating and varied fields of postal history. If they do, it will a add new dimension and interest to their hobby.

The "new" BNA/Canada section makes stamps and their dates of issue much easier to find than in existing catalogues. As a collector of covers to and from both Newfoundland and Canada to other countries, this addition to NSSC is most welcome; a real bonus.

Like anything new, there will undoubtedly be opposition to John's latest contribution to the philately of BNA. Some collectors may never accept the "new" BNA/Canada section nor its concept. If successful, as I think it should be, I predict it will become a separate publication some day. However, if for no other reason, I suggest those who have doubts consider the "new" BNA/Canada section as a convenient time-saving checklist which allows them to record what they have and/or require for a particular stamp, on the same page, under one number, rather than searching through various pages as they have to do in the other catalogues. Furthermore, unlike the Newfoundland-BNA-Canada catalogue, some are much too large and unwieldy to carry on stamp and cover hunting expeditions.

Walsh is known for creating controversy. I think he may have done it again!
